Basic Definitions


Probate: Estate fully administered in Superior Court

Lack of probate: Estate has not been fully administered

in Superior Court

Deceased: Dead

Decedent: The dead person in question








Basic Definitions

• If there is a will, the decedent died testate.

If the will is probated, the people who take under the terms of the will are called *devisees*.

• If there is no will, the decedent died *intestate*.

People who inherit outside of the probate process are called *heirs at law*.







William Jones took title as a single man and never married. He dies. There is a will giving his friend, Sally, his home. His sister, Joy, was named personal representative in the will and there is currently an active probate case.

 - With or without non-intervention powers
 - With or without bond
 - Solvency
- Letters Testamentary









In accordance with RCW 9A.72.085, I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of Washington that the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge:

- 1. Personal Representative. 1 am the Personal Representative of Decedent's estate.
- Decedent. Decedent died intestate on April 24 2014, was then a resident of Kitsap County, Washington, and left property in this state subject to probate.
 - 3. No Will. No valid Will of Decedent has been found.
 - 4. Creditor's Claims. Each Creditor's Claim that was justly due and properly








Laws of descent-RCW 11.04.015

General order of distribution:

- 1. Spouse/domestic partner
- 2. Children
- Children of children
- 4. Parents
- 5. Brothers and sisters
- 6. Grandparents

Statutory Transfers by Operation of Law
